

Use the following marks to signify these accompanying devices in your paper:

**underline** = *Claim* - your belief about a subject (multiple through the paper)

*Citations*

**Dir** = *Direct (Formal)* - author, context, quotation, citation (in parenthesis)

**Par** = *Summary/Paraphrase* - synthesizing large portions with citation (in parenthesis)

**Emb** = *Embedded* - text within analysis to support argument, ending citation (in parenthesis)

**double underline** = *Counterclaim* - someone else's belief opposite your major claim

*Evidence*

**For** = *Forensic* - Evidence from Past (anecdote, analogy, definition)

**Del** = *Deliberative* - Evidence from Present (example, metaphor, description, comp-contrast)

**Dem** = *Demonstrative* - Evidence for Future (cause and effect)

**Highlighted** = *Major Claim* - your paper's main argument (presents a problem and a solution)

*Rhetorical Devices* = methods used to analyze your claim in relation to your support/backing

**Ana** - *Analogy*

**Des** - *Description*

**Class** - *Classification*

**Anec** - *Anecdote*

**C/E** - *Cause and Effect*

**Ex** - *Example*

**Def** - *Definition*

**C/C** - *Comparison-Contrast*

**Square** = *Support/Backing* - evidence that supports your claim

*Sentence Structures* =

**L** = *Loose* - Point of the sentence is at beginning

**P** = *Periodic* - Point of the sentence at the end

**B** = *Base* - small sentence with subject-verb-object

**C** = *Cumulative* - sentences with compounded information (sentences, lists, parallel structure)

**S** = *Suspensive* - sentences with phrases at the beginning

*Outcomes* =

**O-1** = *Strategies* - shifts in tone and rhetorical strategy

**O-2** = *Synthesis/Analysis* of complex texts

**O-3** = *Argument* that ties to Major Claim

**O-4** = *Needs Editing/Revision*
